What is a Safe & Sound Grant? The grant is to help minimise the fear of crime by providing additional home security measures to enable residents to feel safer in their home.

Who is eligible for help? To qualify for assistance applicants must be:
Aged over 60 or disabled. A homeowner or private sector tenant / Housing Association tenant.

How can you help me? We can visit your home to discuss your circumstances and additional home security options available.

What additional home security measures are available to me? Measures include, but are not limited to*: Additional locks for doors and windows, Door Chains, Door viewers, Window alarms, Security Lights

*some types of locks and security measures can only be fitted depending on the type of existing windows and doors.

Kilham Parish Council News

Complaints have been received regarding a number of flyers/leaflets around the village attached to various structures. These flyers are seldom removed after the advertised event making the village look unsightly.

It is a criminal offence under the Highways Act 1980 to place such signs on the public highway including attaching them to street lights, road signs, trees or any other structure on the highway, this is commonly known as fly posting. East Riding have the right to remove the signs and the costs incurred in doing so can be recovered from the person responsible for placing them there, also a fixed penalty notice of £75 per sign can be issued.

All flyers should have a contact number of the organisation as all anonymous posters will be removed. Events that are of local interest organised by individuals or groups from within the community are happy to add a name and contacts details to give legitimacy to the information. They use the various notice boards, village newsletter, the brilliantly efficient 'grapevine' and now often social media to get their message out without resorting to fly posting.

On a happier note, we wish to say a huge thank you to the anonymous residents who have been seen selflessly litter picking along the verges and paths around the village to keep our village looking pristine. Many of you will be aware of the litter strewn approach roads to Kilham. Your Council is actively seeking a litter pick in the worse affected areas but it is encountering a less than helpful response from the Community Payback Team who are now quoting changes to Health & Safety legislation on roads that are

not speed restricted. Wouldn't it be great if everyone recognised the benefit of sharing unspoilt highways and there was no need to tidy up after the careless few?



The Annual General Meeting for the village will be held on Monday the 08th May at 7pm in

the village hall, this will be followed by the Annual Parish meeting at 7.30pm. All are welcome to attend.

The February meeting was the WI Quiz first round. This was enjoyed by all as the questions covered a range of subjects and there was something for everyone. Kilham WI is 90 years old in February 2018 so as part of the celebrations we have launched a 90 new experiences challenge. Between us we hope to record 90 new experiences in the run up to the ninetieth birthday. We

£800 of bird scaring equipment was stolen from a local farmer recently. Poachers are on the move again causing untold amount of damage driving over newly sown crops and also driving straight through a newly planted hedge. If anyone sees anything suspicious like a vehicle driving relentlessly over fields in not a normal manner especially at night “lamping” that is to say a very strong beam coming from a vehicle driving around looking for game to shoot especially at the moment deer because they (the deer) are being sold for a lot of money and poachers are trying to get hold of as much as possible of it. They disregard the shooting season when everyone else abides by the rules and stops killing game when the season ends. Please ring 101 or 999 if anyone sees these activities night or day.

Dog walkers that walk their dogs near the school or anywhere else and don't take any notice where their dogs defecate are going to be penalised, so please remember to take a poo bag with you, . Parents of children at the school are sick of cleaning dog muck off the bottom of their children's shoes and the teachers and caretaker are sick to death of it being trampled into classrooms. It is irresponsible not to clean up after your dog and we are encouraging people who are living in the area of the school to take note of what dog it is, what the person is wearing and if you know the person pass on the information, Anita Harrison would be pleased to take your call in confidence. Dog wardens may be in place soon so they will be able to help and advise on the situation. If the dog wardens come across people walking their dogs and letting them do their ablutions on the grass or paths and not clearing up- action will be taken.

Scams are frequently being reported. A member of the Neighbourhood Watch in Kilham has recently reported that their mother and another elderly lady has had someone ringing them up and asking for their bank details. Unfortunately, one lady had a very substantial amount taken from her, the other lady was a bit luckier because her daughter handles everything for her. **DON'T GIVE ANYONE YOUR BANK DETAILS** no matter how convincing they are.

Spring is on its way, hopefully we will be able to enjoy a bit of gardening but please remember to lock up your gardening tools when you've finished. Sneak thieves are always on the lookout.

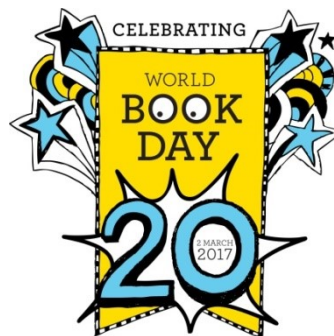

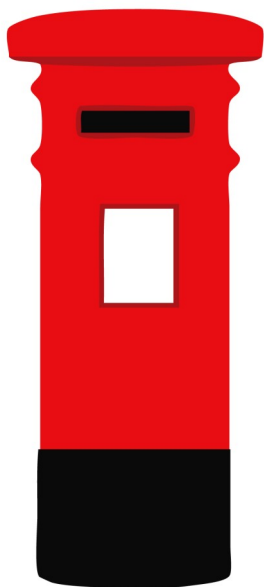

GARDENING JOBS THIS MONTH: IN THE VEGETABLE GARDEN



Dig in a 5cm (or more) layer of compost, well rotted manure or green waste into your beds to prepare for the growing season.

Plant your chitted potatoes outside in the ground or in potato grow bags.

Harvest asparagus spears when they are no more than 18cm tall.

For quick and easy pea supports push some twiggy sticks around your pea plants now.

Thin your carrot seedlings to achieve good-size carrots - do this in the evening when fewer carrot flies are around.

Prepare vegetable seed beds by removing all weeds and forking in plenty of compost.

Cover prepared soil with sheets of black plastic to keep it drier and warmer in preparation for planting.

Many crops can be direct sown into the ground now including parsnips, cabbages and radishes—try to build raised beds to take the bending out of growing vegetables.

IN THE FRUIT GARDEN



Plant out strawberry beds, making sure you enrich the soil first with plenty of well-rotted manure. Place cloches over your strawberry plants for earlier crops.

Protect your fruit blossom from late frosts by covering them with fleece on cold nights.

Spray the emerging leaves of peach and nectarine trees to prevent peach leaf curl. Sheltering your plants from the rain will also reduce the risk of peach leaf curl.

Mulch fruit trees with well rotted manure or garden compost taking care not to mound mulch up around the trunk. Top-dress patio dwarf fruit trees with fresh compost and a slow-release fertiliser

Apply a slow-release fertiliser around the base of your raspberry canes, fruit bushes and fruit trees to encourage good crops this season.

Try hand-pollinating your peaches and nectarines with a soft-bristled paint brush for better crops this year.

LOOKING AFTER YOUR LAWN



Sow lawn seed now on well prepared soil and keep the soil moist whilst the seed is germinating.

For an instant lawn, lay new turf now and ensure it is kept moist until established.

Repair any bare patches in your lawn.

Apply a high-nitrogen fertiliser to your lawn now for a boost to the start of the season.

Now is a good time to apply specialist lawn weed killers to your lawn where moss and weeds are a problem.

On dry days, brush away any worm casts on the lawn.

Mow your lawn more regularly as required, mower blades can be lowered towards the end of the month.

Recut lawn edges to straighten them up. Try installing lawn edging to make future maintenance easier.

Aerate compacted areas of lawn by spiking it with a garden fork.
